SEWAGE SAFETY

Follow these recommendations to ensure you are prepared to deal safely with personal sanitation issues and sewage emergencies in the event of a storm.

- 1. Collect containers to use as temporary toilets. Hazard Management Cayman Islands recommends using garbage bags to line at least two five-gallon buckets with tight-fitting covers.
- 2. Your emergency kit should include moist towelettes, feminine supplies, garbage bags and plastic ties for personal sanitation.
- 3. Ensure you are also equipped with rubber gloves and boots, and eve goggles or a face shield in case you are required to deal at any point with raw sewage or possibly contaminated floodwater.
- 4. Avoid standing water and floodwaters during and after a storm. Floodwaters and standing water can pose serious risks after a storm, including infectious diseases, chemical hazards, and injuries.
- 5. If your onsite wastewater treatment system requires electricity, turn off the pump at the circuit box while it is still safe to do so. Avoid any further contact until the electrical system is dry and clean.
- 6. If you know your home has a history of sewage back-up issues, or if you are in a particularly low-lying area, you may wish to install a backflow prevention device. Talk to your plumber well before the threat of a storm to learn more about how these devices work and whether your home is at risk.

- 7. Know the signs of a faulty septic system. Signs that your onsite wastewater treatment system is not working properly can include:
 - Sinks and/or toilets drain slowly,
 - Floor drains overflow,
 - Sewage is visible outside your home.
- 8. Stay alert for sewage backups in the plumbing at the lowest elevations in your home.
- 9. If items in your home came in contact with sewage or contaminated water, remove and discard anything that cannot be washed and disinfected, such as mattresses, carpeting, carpet padding, rugs, upholstered furniture, cosmetics, stuffed animals, baby toys, pillows, foam-rubber items, books, wall coverings, and most paper products.
